Title: *Connecting the Dots: The Indoctrination Efforts Are More Coordinated Than You Think*

Take Action:

- **Be alert to the language of Critical Theory**, which includes Social Emotional Learning, Critical Race Theory, Comprehensive Sexuality Education, and Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion. It always sounds positive, or at least benign.
- **Know what your child’s daily schedule is at school.** “Counseling” classes can be invasion of privacy opportunities (data collection, “what to think” explorations).
- **Go to your state Department of Education’s website and notice what they brag about.** Do the same with your school district’s website. Watch for code words.
- **Opt out of surveys and questionnaires.** Your state Department of Education and your school district should have forms.
- **Collect your own data about the culture.** Watch television commercials. The desensitizing and normalizing efforts are everywhere.
- **Discourage social media as much as you can.**
- **Be willing to admit that all of this is real**, even in your school district. You must educate yourself.

- **Find like-minded parents and friends** in organizations and churches to share information and offer support for action.
- **Assertively educate your elected representatives.** They usually don't want to know.
- **Teach at home, constantly.** Children (even college students) crave truth and need to build courage.
